Growing up in Bastrop in the 1980s, Ishmael spent much of his time with his late grandparents, CP and Ruby Johnson, who lived in the city for over 40 years. His grandmother was a caregiver, and his grandfather was a rancher and town bus driver. He and his sister, Shamael, were often by their side.

At age 6, Ishmael participated in a special grant-funded program for gifted students, studying the Colorado River. His commitment to the community began at 15 with his first summer job at the Boys and Girls Club of Bastrop, where he worked for four years. He also started volunteering and coaching youth sports, helping to launch HoopStars. Over the years, he has continued coaching in Bastrop, now mentoring the children of those he coached in his younger days.

For over 20 years, Ishmael has worked in the Wastewater Department for Austin Water, gaining expertise in advanced wastewater treatment and the effects of growth and development on city infrastructure.

His involvement in city government began in 2019 when he spoke before the Planning and Zoning Commission to oppose a proposed gas station, sharing his vision for Bastrop's future.
